A message from SMS Benjamin Quen Retired

As Jack pointed out, being retired isn't what it's thought to be. This is what I've been up to since the last Installer went out. I'm still heavily involved with Search and Rescue as is Bill Foster. There have been several new members join, so much of my efforts have been directed at training. July of last year I was elected President of Mt. Calvary Catholic Cemetery located in Klamath Falls. With that I've been spending a great deal of time correcting 80 years of cemetery records and doing fundraising projects for completion of a Cemetery Chapel. PROJECT FAST RACE

Below, are excerpts from a document that Chief Gessell (215 EIS) sent me. This is a project that was done back in late 1966 and early 1967. I thought it might be interesting reading for you on our unit history. The document details the projects done by all units. I copied the 216th portion (Laon AB, France) below. The entire document is posted on the unit history page of the web site. **Please let me know if anyone has any details on who participated in this project. I would like to capture the names for our unit history.**

PROJECT FAST RACE

Project FAST RACE was that portion of FRELOC which removed the communications-electronics-meterological (C-E-M) equipment from those French bases scheduled to close by 1 April 1967. This report covers the GEEIA Air National Guard participation in Project Fast Race during the period 15 July 66 to 15 February 67.

FAST RACE was the first time ANG/GEEIA forces from each of the 17 squadrons were used as combined teams, with rank dictating command --- not unit of origin. The officers and airmen of the GEEIA Guard proved that they were highly mobile, qualified and capable of performing C-E-M tasks anywhere in the world. These teams removed items such as TACAN, GCA, telephone central offices, steel towers, microwave, UHF and VHF radio, control towers and radar.

The ANG/GEEIA Squadrons became involved in this program because extremely time and date conscious "one-time shot" workload almost unsolvable problems for GEEIA, due to great demands being made by other high priority commitments around the globe. The ANG/GEEIA organizations were approached to determine if the use of their people on a volunteer basis would be practical. Calls were made to thirteen states in which the 17 ANG units were located to determine if enough volunteers could be mustered. Four hundred thirty-three personnel answered, volunteering for periods ranging from 31 days to the maximum of 89 days. Armed with this information, a request for approval to use ANG/GEEIA troops directed through AFLC to the National Guard Bureau. This approval was received at Headquarters GEEIA on 26 September 1966.

All project data was compiled, logistical and administrative support for the ANG was arranged and pre-removal surveys were completed by the 2874th GEEIA Squadron, Ramstein AB, Germany. An ANG Project Office was established at European GEEIA Region, Wiesbaden AB, Germany.

Lt Col Paul D. Kerr, Commander of the 205th ANG/GEEIA Squadron, Oklahoma City, was the initial officer in charge. This first ANG contingent, two officers and three NCO's arrived at European GEEIA Region on 2 November 1966. Between 2-15 November, this team established the final procedures to accomplish payrolls, TDY, vouchers and transportation within Europe.

LAON AB, FRANCE

Under the guidance of SMSGT James L. Shearer, team NCOIC, assisted by TSGT William R. Pinkston, both of the 216th GEEIA Squadron, California ANG, Hayward, California, the entire job was completed ahead of schedule. This 19 man team of 60 and 89 day people was plagued by severe icing problems which, on many occasions caused complete cessation of work. In addition to the normal base dismantling work, this team, with the assistance of TSGT Bobby F. Malone, 205th GEEIA Sq, Oklahoma, removed an entire American type telephone central office in record time, plus two microwave sites south of Laon. Two thousand one hundred fifty-two man-hours were expended. Active duty was from 15 November 1966 to 11 February 1967.
